Daily Inspections

When doing your daily maintenance check you need to ensure that you are looking at the following:

- Forks - look for weld breaks, raise and lower the forks with and without a load
- Tires - check to see if there is any rubber missing
- Cylinders - check to make sure there are no leaks, including drips
- Hydraulic hoses - look for any punctures or cuts in the hoses
- Chain - check that the tension on the chain is tight
- Carriage - look for any weld breaks
- Seat belt - check that it is in good repair
- Propane tank (if it has one) - check that it isn't loose
- Radiator - check for leaks and clean debris or trash caught in it
- Emergency brake and accelerator - check that they are in working order
- Controls - ensure that they are all in good repair
- Safety lights, battery, alarms, & horn - check that they are all in working order
- Fluid levels - check your engine oil, fuel, radiator water, and hydraulic fluid levels

FORKLIFT RODEOS ARE A REAL THING

Yeah, we said forklift rodeo. These spirited competitions, usually held by companies or manufacturing groups, involve elaborate maneuvering, specialized skills, and other difficult tasks for forklift drivers. Anything from driving between narrow barriers to speed stacking are included. The winners of forklift rodeos are some of the most skilled professionals in the world. FORKLIFTS ARE LIKE SPIDERS

Yes, that's right, forklifts and spiders are similar. How can that be, you might ask? Well, spiders use hydraulic pressure to support and move their legs. Without bones, spiders need a different way to move their limbs, so they utilize the same kind of hydraulic pressure that is used to lift the forks on a forklift. Hydraulic pressure is a very efficient way to move an object, just by changing the amount of fluid in a tube.

THE BIG TIME

Forklifts are used in big places and carry big loads. For instance, the largest building that uses forklifts is the Boeing Everett Factory. This 400,000 sqm facility uses forklifts to transport materials from warehouse to factory. And, we know that forklifts can handle pretty heavy loads, but the world record weight lifted by a forklift was 90 tons and was accomplished in 1989. The record still stands. If there's any doubt the 1980s were the greatest decade ever, that 90 ton lift settles it once and for all!
